Miss Richfield 1981 never disappoints - she appears in fabulous outfits, her hair is never out of place, and she is always totally inappropriate.

Performances begin December 7 and run through December 17 in Illusion's home at the Center for Performing Arts at 38th and Pleasant in South Minneapolis. Seating is limited.

This year's show celebrates 25 years of Miss R's Holiday Shows at Illusion Theater. Expect lots of silver!

Miss R is known for her razor-sharp wit, for the laugh-out-loud videos she shares and the anticipation that any audience member might be chosen to be a "volunteer" in her show's shenanigans.

Russ King, aka Miss Richfield 1981, grew up in Richfield Minnesota, became a journalist, and created this character while he was the Public Information Officer for the Minnesota AIDS Project. He then met Illusion's Executive Producing Director Michael Robins who was serving as the President of the AIDS Project. Russ's character first emceed several AIDS Awareness events in the Twin Cities, then appeared in "a radio show" at Bryant Lake Bowl. Michael and Bonnie invited Russ to further develop the character in Illusion's Fresh Ink Series. In 1999 Miss Richfield 1981 created what has now become a Christmas Tradition bringing her Holiday Pro'grum to sell-out audiences at Illusion Theater.

Miss Richfield 1981's reputation has now taken her far afield from Richfield, MN. She sells out shows in New York, Chicago, San Francisco, San Diego, Philadelphia, Atlanta, and South Florida. She tours with Atlantis events, cruise ships and resorts; is a television spokesperson for the travel company Orbitz; and she serves as a national brand ambassador for the City of Palm Springs. Every summer she leaves Richfield to go to Provincetown Massachusetts where she nightly fills the Pilgrim House.
