NOTE FROM ZAINABU JALLO

(Playwright)

We Take Care of Our Own peeks into the lives of three individuals facing the difficulties of ageing in the diaspora. Having interrupted familial traditions of intergenerational care by their choices to migrate, they attempt to find a sense of community as a medley of memories and apprehensions flood their conversations.

Immense gratitude goes to: Camargo Foundation; Illusion Theater; Carlyle Brown, who I refer to as the "midwife" of this play; the production team; and special thanks to my family and every one of the beautiful people I have encountered in the course of writing this play.

NOTE FROM CARLYLE BROWN (Director and Co-curator)

I was immediately attracted to *We Take Care of Our Own*, to its use of language - playful, poetic, percussive - its slightly heightened nature, all of which to my ear contributed to the African-ness of the play. It is the kind of play I like - theatrical, authentic, grounded in simplicity, its themes relevant, with something to say. It makes you think and causes you to wonder. Zainabu Jallo, playwright, is a true child of the African Diaspora, born in Nigeria of a Nigerian father and a mother with Brazilian roots, she refers to herself as a rolling stone, living in different cities on different continents, calling five cities her home. She lives and actively participates in the here and there of a diasporic condition. A playwright, poet, and scholar with her doctoral research in the study of diasporic consciousness with a special interest in the intersections of



theatre and spiritual performance, she is a poster child for what we are exploring in the Cultural Diaspora Project.

"MEET THREE PLAYWRIGHTS FROM THE AFRICAN DIASPORA WHO MAKE THEIR NARRATIVES OUT OF AN AFRO-ATLANTIC POINT OF VIEW. STORYTELLERS AND GRIOTS CREATING INTRICATE, EXPANSIVE NARRATIVES WHERE BLACK LIVES DON'T SIMPLY MATTER BUT ARE ESSENTIAL."

In the summer of 2018, Chuck Mike and I convened four African American and four African playwrights for a month-long residency of the Cultural Diaspora Program at the Camargo Foundation to explore their craft, their voices, and their African-ness without the white, Western gaze. The Program supports established and mid-career playwrights from the African Diaspora for whom their Afro-Atlantic identity is an influence and factor in their craft, the content they create, their thinking and their world view.

The following summer, 2019, in partnership with the Camargo Foundation and the Playwrights' Center in Minneapolis, three plays from the 2012 Camargo residency were presented in staged readings in the first Afro-Atlantic Playwright Festival. Those plays were *Deux Femmes on the Edge de la Revolution Part 2*, the second installment in France-Luce Benson's epic historical trilogy of the Haitian Revolution; *Canoes* by veteran Nigerian playwright Femi Osofisan, a study of three young Black women coming of age in Kwame Nkrumah's newly independent Ghana who would become international literary giants, Efua Sutherland of Ghana, Maryse Conde' from Guadeloupe and Maya Angelou from the United States; and *We Take Care of Our Own*, Nigerian playwright Zainabu Jallo's tender tale of migration and aging in the diaspora.


The first Afro-Atlantic Playwright Festival was a success and as a result the Cultural Diaspora Playwrights' project was invited to New York University Tisch School of Drama; to BOUNDLESS AFRICA, a celebration of African writers at the Kennedy Center; and a workshop and staged reading in Accra at the National Theater of Ghana.

Now, in partnership with the Camargo Foundation, the Playwrights' Center, and Illusion Theater where I am currently the Mellon Playwright in Residence, we are presenting the second Afro-Atlantic Playwright Festival featuring a full production of Zainabu Jallo's *We Take Care of Our Own* running at Illusion Theater October 13-29 plus two staged readings of playwrights from 2022 Cultural Diaspora Residency at Camargo -- *The Red Dragon* by Tonderai Munyevu and Cassandra Medley's play *MY SOUL IS NOT RESTED*.

THE AFRICAN DIASPORA

The African Diaspora is the term used to describe the mass dispersion of peoples from Africa during the Transatlantic Slave Trades, from the 1500s to the 1800s.

This Diaspora took millions of people from Western and Central Africa to different regions throughout the Americas and the Caribbean.

ZAINABU JALLO (Playwright)

is a scholar, playwright, and portrait photographer. Her academic and creative works have been conveyed through Fellowships at the Sundance Theater Institute, The Institute for World Literature, Harvard University, Institute for Cultural Diplomacy in Berlin, Residenz Theater Munich, Chateau Lavigny, and House of Writers in Switzerland. She is a Fellow of the Royal Society of Arts England, and UNESCO Coalition of Artists for the General History of Africa. She is the author of award-winning plays–*Onions Make Us Cry, Holy Night*, and *My Sultan Is a Rockstar*. Jallo is post-doctoral researcher and lecturer at the University of Basel, Switzerland. She is one of the Principal Investigators of the "Sacral Architecture Africa" Project. Her scholarly interests include The Afro-Atlantic, Iconic criticism, the history of Criminal Anthropology and Material Culture. https://zainabujallo.com/

CARLYLE BROWN (Co-Curator, Director)

is playwright/performer, curator and artistic director of Carlyle Brown & Company based in Minneapolis. His plays include *Little Tommy Parker's Celebrated Colored Minstrel Show, The African Company Presents Richard III, Pure Confidence, Are You Now or Have You Ever Been? Down in Mississippi, A Play by Barb and Carl.* Carlyle's plays have been produced at theatres across the country and internationally. Currently he is the Andrew W. Mellon Playwright-in-Residence at Illusion Theater. Most recently he won the 2022 Legacy Award from the Legacy Playwrights Initiative which recognizes established American playwrights for their sustained influence on the American theatre. He is also the 2019 Helen Merrill Award recipient, the 2018 William Inge Award for Distinguished Achievement in the American Theater, the 2010 Otto Rene Castillo Award for Political Theatre, he received the 2010 United States Artist Fellowship, a 2009 Guggenheim Fellowship, and the 2006 Black Theatre Network's Winona Lee Fletcher Award for outstanding achievement and artistic excellence.

CHUCK MIKE (Co-Curator)

was born in Brooklyn, New York and has lived in Nigeria since 1976. A practical disciple of Wole Soyinka and former MacArthur Foundation Fellow, he is a distinguished actor, producer, director, and theatre activist of enormous energy. Producer of four festivals/seasons of theatre for CAFTAN (Collective Artistes Festival of Theatre Arts Nigeria), he is founding director of The Performance Studio Workshop (Nigeria) and Collective Artistes (Nigeria and UK). His forte is "devising" Theatre for Development. Spaces of work range from villages across Southern, Western, and Eastern Africa to The Kennedy Centre, Lincoln Centre (USA), West Yorkshire Playhouse, The Royal Court (UK), MUSON Centre, and The National Theatre (Nigeria). Chuck also shares his off season time with teaching and has taught or conducted workshops at various institutions across the globe, some of which include the Universities of Ife and Ibadan (Nigeria), Leeds, Oxford and The Royal National Theatre Studio (UK), Smith College, New York University (USA), and the University of Toronto. Currently, he holds an Associate Professorship at the University of Richmond, Virginia.



WARREN C. BOWLES*

(YOUSSOUF SADIO) is making his debut at Illusion Theater. He has experience as an actor, director, fight choreographer,

and playwright at Mixed Blood Theatre, The Guthrie Theater, Six Points Theater, Ten Thousand Things Theater, History Theatre, A Contemporary Theatre, Colorado Shakespeare Festival, Kingsmen Shakespeare Company, American Players' Theater, Park Square Theatre, and others across the country. His degrees come from the Universities of Minnesota and Notre Dame with studies at l'Université Catholique de l'Ouest (Angers, France). He received a 2005 McKnight Fellowship for Theater Artists, a 2016 Ivey recognition for directing, and in 2013 he was named a "Local Legend" at the annual MLK breakfast.
